RESEARCH AND THE FARM BILL


The current farm bill was signed into law on December 20, 2018 and remains in force through 2023. It includes 12 titles, including Title VII, which focuses on research programs.

TITLE VII BACKGROUND:

- Since 1977, the farm bill has included a title focused on agricultural research, extension, and education (REE). The research title is often a source of bipartisan collaboration within the farm bill.
- Four agencies carry out USDA's REE mission area: the National Institute of Food and Agriculture (extramural programs), Agricultural Research Service (intramural scientific research), Economic Research Service (economic and social science research), and the National Agricultural Statistics Service (Census of Agriculture and farm sector statistics).
- USDA distributes capacity grants among eligible institutions based on formulas in statute and competitive grants directly to individual projects selected through a peer-review process.
- Established in the 2014 Farm Bill, the Foundation for Food and Agriculture Research (FFAR) is a nonprofit research corporation designed to leverage private funding with federal dollars to support innovative public agricultural research.
- Most research title programs require annual discretionary appropriations. Upon enactment of the 2018 Farm Bill, projected mandatory spending for the research title totaled \$694 million for FY2019-FY2023, accounting for less than 0.2% of total projected farm bill mandatory spending.

ISSUES TO WATCH:

- U.S. public funding for agricultural research has declined by a third over the past twenty years, peaking in 2002 and declining to hit the lowest levels since 1970.
- This has happened during the same time that other nations like China, Brazil, and India have committed significant investments to public agricultural research.
- The research community is seeking a significant investment of mandatory funding in the next farm bill's research title. However, achieving additional mandatory funding will be a significant challenge, especially with the debt ceiling debate looming.
- Three "orphan" programs do not have a budget baseline for funding beyond FY2023 and therefore wouldn't receive any funding under a farm bill extension. The largest of these is FFAR, which currently has more than 300 private sector partners. Stakeholders are interested in making FFAR a permanent, baseline program.
- Stakeholders have also raised concerns about needing increased investment to address aging agricultural research infrastructure at the nation's land-grant universities.
- Addressing climate change is a major priority for the Biden administration and Democrats on Capitol Hill. The next farm bill could be a way for Congress to consider whether existing authorities, programs, and funding levels for climate change research and extension adequately address the needs of farmers and ranchers, but questions remain.

Freshman Senator John Fetterman (D-PA) has taken over as Chair of the subcommittee and Senator Mike Braun (R-IN) has returned as the Ranking Member. The Senate Agriculture Committee also underwent some structural changes for the 118th, giving greater autonomy to the subcommittees to organize stakeholder hearings on farm bill topics.

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Under Chairman Thompson's leadership, the House Agriculture subcommittee structure changed for the 118th Congress, with conservation joining with research and biotechnology. Rep. Jim Baird (R-IN), who served as the Ranking Member of the research subcommittee in the 117th Congress, is now serving as Chair, with Rep. Abigail Spanberger (D-VA) serving as the top Democrat.

NOTABLE MARKER BILLS

ADVANCING CUTTING EDGE (ACE) AGRICULTURE ACT

- Bipartisan, bicameral.
- Doubles the budget of the USDA advanced research program, AgARDA, to \$100 million and adds climate resilience as a research priority.

AGRICULTURE RESILIENCE ACT

- Bicameral, Democrat only.
- This sweeping bill aims to reduce the climate impact of the agricultural sector with the goal of achieving net zero emission by 2040. This bill would significantly grow the climate research portfolio at USDA.

BIOCHAR RESEARCH NETWORK ACT

- Bipartisan, bicameral.
- The bill would establish a national biochar research network at USDA to study the benefits of biochar across different soils, regions, and land uses.

PLANT BIOSTIMULANT ACT

- Bipartisan, bicameral.
- The bill would define "plant biostimulant" and require a study on how biostimulants impact soil health.

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
